
STEP UP AA'S Survey on Discrimination

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

OVERVEEW

At our event, "Rise Against Racism", we took the opportunity to ask attendees a few questions regarding racism in Edmonton. Over 50% of the people in attendence were 30 years of age or younger. In total, we had 35 responses. We asked if they believe racism is a problem in Edmonton. 68.6% of individuals scored high on this question. 1 is strongly disagree and 5 is strongly agree.



82.9% of attendees said they have been a victim of, or witnessed discrimination.



"More anti-racism workshops."

"Teaching accurate world and Canadian history."

"Policy level change."

"Teaching rural communities."

We asked participants if they believed that EDI workshops incorporated within school systems were adequate. Responses were mixed, but leaning towards disagree. 1 is strongly disagree and 5 is strongly agree.



We asked what changes they would make to EDI work/ practices in schools. These are some of the responses:

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"More teaching on the negative effects of discrimination."

"Greater acknowledgement that changes need to be made." "Incorporating antiracism initiatives into post-secondary institutions."

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"More training for teachers to be able to navigate racist comments and remarks."
